Web-Based PowerSchool Student Information System

Information is available about how to log on to a private account and access real-time information. The system includes a student and parent portal, enabling students and parents to see similar information such as attendance, grades, assignments, teachers' comments and upcoming school events. Students and parents will be able to log on anywhere there is internet access such as home, work or school.

School Hours

The school doors are open at 7:45 am each morning and there is student supervision provided at this time. Student Fees

Fees: There are no general student fees again this year. However, there may be things (such as school athletics, clubs and trips, etc.) throughout the year that need to be directly paid for.

<u>Locks: \$10.00 – due by Sept 20, 2024</u>. All students must have a school lock. They keep this throughout their time at HCJH and is theirs when they leave. Info will be sent out on how to pay this through the new <u>e-transfer</u> process (optional) prior to the start of school year.

If there is ever a difficulty paying any of the school fees, please reach out to the principal (Jim Curry <u>jcurry@hrce.ca</u> or 902 479 4214) for assistance. All inquiries are kept strictly confidential.

Lunch Time

Grade 7 & 8 students have the option of leaving school property during lunch time with a signed permission form. With signing this form, you, the parent/guardian, accept responsibility for your child if they leave the property on any given day. Students who have the form signed are not required to leave each day, they just have the option to do so. Students who do not have the form signed cannot leave the property even with a note from a parent/guardian. The only way students that do not have a signed form can leave the property is if parent/guardian come to the school and signs them out. Students who leave the property at lunch without permission will be dealt with through the Provincial Code of Conduct.

During our lunch time, students who remain on property have the option of going to intramurals, clubs, extra-help during designated times, cafeteria, library, anywhere on the main floor, and of course outside on school property. Students are not permitted past the fence of the back field. On inclement weather days, students will have the option of being on the bottom and top floors where there will be supervision and all other indoor places mentioned above.

For September 5 & 6 will be asking all students (unless you are walking home) to remain on campus until we can have permission forms returned to the office.

· Grade 6 students are not permitted leave the school property at lunch Scent / Peanut Aware

There are students and staff at HCJH who have severe allergies to scented and peanut products. Out of respect for fellow students and staff, we ask everyone to refrain from bringing these kinds of products to school.

Vaping / Use of Tobacco products

Students and parents need to know that the use of vapor cigarettes or ecigarettes, with or without nicotine filters, is not permitted to be used by students on any school property. Use of any of the above products will result in disciplinary action through the Provincial Code of Conduct. This also applies for use of tobacco products off school property during school hours.

Cell/Smart Phones

As you are likely aware the **Department of Education and Early Childhood Development** have now instated changes surrounding cell phone policies at all NS schools and I want to provide you with what that will look like in our school:

- a) In Grade 6 All students will be required to turn off their personal mobile devices and store them out of sight during instructional day (this includes recess and lunch).
- b) In Grades 7 & 8 Cell phones will be kept in student lockers except for teachers allowing use in class for instructional purposes. Students will be able to access devices at recess and lunch hour

As this policy will represent a significant shift from our former policy, teachers and administration will be working with students & community on how to best institute the changes here at school. Please know that we will be communicating with parents and guardians every step of the way.

What is and what is not bullying? (Please review with your child)

Rude = **Inadvertently saying or doing something that hurts someone else.** From kids, rudeness might look more like burping in someone's face, jumping ahead in line, bragging about achieving the highest grade or even throwing a crushed-up pile of leaves

in someone's face. On their own, any of these behaviours could appear as elements of bullying, but when looked at in context, incidents of rudeness are usually spontaneous, unplanned inconsideration, based on thoughtlessness, poor manners or narcissism, but not meant to hurt someone.

Mean = Purposefully saying or doing something to hurt someone once (or maybe twice).

The main distinction between "rude" and "mean" behavior has to do with intention; while rudeness is often unintentional, mean behavior very much aims to hurt or depreciate someone. Kids are mean to each other when they criticize clothing, appearance, intelligence, coolness or just about anything else they can find to denigrate. Meanness also sounds like words spoken in anger - impulsive cruelty that is often regretted in short order. Very often, mean behavior in kids is motivated by angry feelings and/or the misguided goal of propping themselves up in comparison to the person they are putting down. Commonly, meanness in kids sounds an awful lot like:

- "Are you seriously wearing that sweater again? Didn't you just wear it, like, last week? Get a life."
- "You are so fat/ugly/stupid/gay."
- "I hate you!"

Make no mistake, mean behaviours can wound deeply, and adults can make a huge difference in the lives of young people when they hold kids accountable for being mean. Yet, meanness is different from bullying in important ways that should be understood and differentiated when it comes to intervention. These types of situations typically fall under discriminatory misconduct or verbal abuse in the Provincial Code of Conduct.

Bullying = Intentionally aggressive behavior, repeated over time, that involves an imbalance of power.

Experts agree that bullying entails <u>three key elements</u>: an intent to harm, a power imbalance and repeated acts or threats of aggressive behaviour. Kids who bully say or do something intentionally hurtful to others and they keep doing it, with no sense of regret or remorse, even when targets of bullying show or express their hurt or tell the aggressors to stop.

Bullying may be physical, verbal, relational, or carried out via technology:

- **Physical aggression** was once the gold standard of bullying— the "sticks and stones" that made adults in charge stand up and take notice. This kind of bullying includes hitting, punching, kicking, spitting, tripping, hair pulling, slamming a child into a locker and a range of other behaviors that involve physical aggression.
- **Verbal aggression** is what our parents used to advise us to "just ignore." We now know that despite the old adage, words and threats can, indeed, hurt and can even cause profound, lasting harm.
- **Relational aggression** is a form of bullying in which kids use their friendship, or the threat of taking their friendship away, to hurt someone. Social exclusion, shunning, hazing, and rumour spreading are all forms of this pervasive type of bullying that can be especially beguiling and crushing to kids.
- **Cyberbullying** is a specific form of bullying that involves technology. It is the "wilful and repeated harm inflicted through the use of computers, cell phones, and other

electronic devices." Notably, the likelihood of repeated harm is especially high with cyberbullying because electronic messages can be accessed by multiple parties, resulting in repeated exposure and repeated harm.

So, why is it so important to make the distinction between rude, mean and bullying?

It is important to distinguish between rude, mean and bullying so that teachers, school administrators, police, youth workers, parents and kids all know what to pay attention to and when and how to intervene.

***If your child or someone your child knows is a possible victim of bullying or cyberbullying, we encourage you to speak to our Guidance Counsellor, Vice Principal, or Principal.
